## Re-use Your Christmas Tree and Greenery!

Don't put it at the curb...recycle and re-use your cut Christmas tree, greens and wreaths in your garden! Use trees as shelter for birds or as windbreaks for tender plants such as rhododendron and boxwood. You may also remove the branches and spread them, along with wreaths and garland over bulb plantings and perennials for winter mulch to remove in the Spring.



### Keeping Amaryllis to Flower Again

The houseplant popularity known as amaryllis is often a desired plant at Christmas. Many are sold already flowering during the winter, or as bulbs in a kit that grow with phenomenal speed once started. They will flower another year by following these easy tips:

- Cut the flower stalks close to their point of origin once the flower fades.
- Keep watered, and feed occasionally
- From late spring onwards keep in a greenhouse, if possible
- Otherwise, stand the plant outside for the summer.
- Let the foliage die down in late summer or the autumn.
- Start into growth again in late autumn or early winter, by fertilizing to encourage strong blooms.

# So, why do we send flowers on Valentine's Day?

The history of Valentine's Day, legend says, originated during the third century in Rome. During this time, Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers, so he outlawed marriage for young men. A young priest named Valentine was furious with this injustice and defied Claudius by continuing to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. Claudius eventually discovered Valentine's actions and sentenced him to death. During his time in jail, Valentine fell in love with his jailer's daughter, who visited him in prison. Before he was put to death, Valentine sent a letter to the girl and signed it, "From Your Valentine" — an expression we still use today. Valentine was executed on February 14, 270 AD. Later, around 496 AD, Pope Gelasius declared Feb. 14 a day to honor Valentine, who by that time had become a saint.

Today, we continue to honor St. Valentine and recall the history of Valentine's Day each year on February 14 by celebrating our love for significant others, friends, and family. For centuries, flowers have symbolized fertility, love, marriage, and romance. Valentine's Day is also one of the biggest holidays to send flowers. The rose is the traditional Valentine's Day flower, as it signifies romantic love, but there are many other flowers that people send to communicate the different types of love they feel for those important people in their lives.


